The Commissioners do not recommend any alteration in the Divisions as constituted by the Act.

The places temporarily appointed by the Act for holding Courts for the Election of Members are—

For <i>West Kent</i>	-	-	Blackheath.
For <i>Mid-Kent</i>	-	-	Maidstone.

The Commissioners are of opinion that Maidstone is the most suitable place of Election for *Mid-Kent*, but for *West Kent* they consider Sevenoaks preferable to Blackheath, which latter place is situated in the extreme north-western angle of the Division, and in a Metropolitan District.

Sevenoaks, which is situated on a branch line of the London, Chatham, and Dover Railway, is 25 miles from London; and will shortly be connected with London and the eastern side of the Division by a direct line. These two railways, and another projected line from Maidstone, will place it in connexion with all parts of the Division,

The Commissioners recommend, therefore, that the following Towns should be constituted the places of Election for the two Divisions of West Kent, viz.:—

Sevenoaks—for *West Kent*.

Maidstone—for *Mid-Kent*.
